



Views of Economy Remain Negative, More Optimism about Housing than Job Market July 18-22, 2013

- 61% say the economy is in bad shape and just 30% say it is improving, down from 34% last month.
- While 48% think the housing market is getting better, just 30% say the same for the job market, and nearly as many (29%) think the job market is getting worse.
- Few Americans are feeling flush: just a quarter say they can save money or buy extras, unchanged since earlier this year.
- At 48%, President Barack Obama's approval rating is similar to what it was last month. 45% approve of his handling of the economy; 49% disapprove.
- Other issues: Americans are divided about the Zimmerman verdict, 55% now support same-sex marriage and a majority disapproves of Edward Snowden's actions.

Americans continue to rate the nation's economy badly: six in ten still say it is in bad shape, while 37% say it is good. Views of the economy are more positive now compared to last year at this time, but the percentage that says the economy is in bad shape has been 60% or higher since January 2008.

Optimism about the economy's direction has ebbed slightly from last month. 30% of Americans now say the economy is improving – down from 34% in June.

Economic Indicators

Even though the nation's unemployment rate has inched below 8% for 10 consecutive months, Americans are not feeling especially optimistic about the job market. While 30% think the job market is getting better, about as many (29%) feel it is getting worse.

Americans, however, are more positive about two other economic areas: the housing market and the stock market. 48% think the housing market is improving (only 12% say it's getting worse). The public is also three times as likely to say the stock market is getting better than getting worse. More than four in ten say the stock market is holding steady.

Personal Finances

As for their own financial situation, most Americans say they can make ends meet, but just a quarter says their income is enough to save money and buy some extras. As might be expected, those with lower household incomes are especially likely to be feeling less financially secure.

President Barack Obama

The President's overall approval rating is now 48%, similar to what it was last month. Mr. Obama's approval rating has hovered below 50% for the past few months.

More Americans continue to disapprove (49%) than approve (45%) of President Obama's handling of the economy. He receives his highest marks on handling terrorism, while his approval ratings on the economy, foreign policy and immigration remain below 50%. The President's ratings on most of these issues have held steady since last month, although his approval rating on immigration is up four points.

On the heels of Federal Reserve Chair Ben Bernanke's testimony before Congress last week, Americans are split in their assessment of the Fed's ability to promote economic growth. Nearly four in ten say they don't know enough to rate the Federal Reserve.

About a third of Americans think the country is headed in the right direction, but nearly six in ten think it is on the wrong track. Those figures have changed little in the past few months.

After the Zimmerman Verdict

Americans are sharply divided over the Zimmerman verdict, whereby George Zimmerman was found not guilty of all charges. 42% of Americans say they are either satisfied or pleased by the verdict, but 46% describe themselves as either disappointed or angry.

Feelings about the Zimmerman verdict reveal a division along racial lines. While 52% of whites are at least satisfied with the not guilty verdict, an overwhelming 94% of blacks feel differently: 53% of blacks say they are disappointed and 41% describe themselves as angry.

There is a large division by political party as well, with 73% of Republicans satisfied or pleased, and 65% of Democrats either disappointed or angry. Independents are more divided, though they lean towards disappointed.

Same-Sex Marriage

Nearly a month after the U.S. Supreme Court's rulings on same-sex marriage, 55% of Americans now say it should be legal for same-sex couples to marry, up slightly from June (before the rulings) and the highest percentage since CBS News began asking this question in 2012. 39% say same-sex marriage should not be legal.

Partisan and age differences persist: Most Democrats and independents favor allowing samesex couples to marry, but most Republicans do not. Young Americans, those ages 18 to 29, are especially likely to support same-sex marriage, while those who are older are less likely to.

Snowden and NSA Surveillance

Most Americans, including majorities of both Democrats and Republicans, disapprove of government contractor Edward Snowden leaking information about the government's collection of Americans' phone call records.

And while two in three Americans view the government's collection of phone records as a violation of privacy, a majority also sees it as a necessary tool to help find terrorists.

This poll was conducted by telephone from July 18-22, 2013 among 1,036 adults nationwide. Data collection was conducted on behalf of CBS News by Social Science Research Solutions of Media, PA. Phone numbers were dialed from samples of both standard land-line and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points. The error for subgroups may be higher. Interviews were conducted in English and Spanish. This poll release conforms to the Standards of Disclosure of the National Council on Public Polls.
